

RIGHT ORDER RIGHT TIME


Times have changed since you were in school. The stakes are high with increased competition to get into college & the cost of attendance is rapidly increasing.

Our year-by-year tool goes from 9th grade through the summer after graduation & will help your family to plan ahead and beat (not meet) deadlines.

Extracurriculars are an important part of high school fun & will help you plan your future. High-level extracurriculars are an important part of college apps.

Keep Grades Up

High school is harder & requires more study time. Your GPA is the most important piece of getting into college.

Focus on good study habits & ask for help when needed even if it means getting tutoring. There's nothing wrong with getting assistance.

Practice makes progress!

Choose 10th Grade Classes

Select classes that will challenge yet not overwhelm you. Focus on rigor in your areas of strength. Don't try to be superhuman.

Sketch out courses for 11th & 12th grade knowing your choices might change.

This will be the freest summer you'll likely have in high school, but don't waste it away. Plan for a balance of fun and purpose. If you've not found a volunteer opportunity where you can be regularly involved & it aligns with who you are, now is a great time to do so.

Keep Grades Up & Plan for Course Rigor

As you move through high school, you'll have greater opportunities for electives & more rigorous courses. Challenge yourself. Colleges will vary in their expectations of what courses & how many credits. Choose courses that fit your academic strengths & goals.

Make an ACT-SAT Testing Timeline

While it's not yet time to test, make a testing timeline now. Plan for 3 testing attempts that are complete by fall of 12th grade. Try to test in your less busy season.

ACT & SAT dates stay relatively the same from year to year.

Begin Career Planning

By August of 12th grade, you'll need to select a college major to which you'll apply. Some majors need to be selected at this time or you can't switch to them later.

Start the work now so you'll have time to know yourself, know careers, & make informed major decisions on which colleges to visit & apply to.

Create a College Budget

College is typically a family investment of \$100,000 or more. For most families, it's one of the top 3 life investments along with owning a home & retirement.

Set a budget now before visiting colleges. It's almost impossible to create a college list that "fits" without a budget.



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2nd Semester

Choose between ACT or SAT

That's right, all colleges accept ACT & SAT equally. Students should focus on their test of strength. Discover your teen's test of strength by taking ACT & SAT Diagnostic Tests with your test prep provider of choice. PSAT scores can be substituted for a diagnostic SAT.



Take the ACT or SAT

Algebra 2 is in the driver's seat when determining WHEN to test. Students who have completed algebra 2 by the end of 10th grade may want to test as early as the summer after 10th. Students taking algebra 2 in 11th grade will want to start no earlier than winter of 11th grade.

All students want to aim to finish all testing by fall of 12th grade ahead of college application deadlines which can be as early as October 15.

Narrow College Majors of Interest

Think of college planning as: Career --> Major --> College

The end goal of the college investment is a career your student will thrive in & be prepared to launch into the world instead of back into your basement.

All tools available to college students for college major & career planning are available to high school students. Do the work now to make a wise choice of college later.

Plan College Visit Dates

Get out the school calendar & your family calendar then reserve dates when students are off school, but college is in session, & plan to do college visits.

Ilth grade is a very busy time & academically challenging, so it's important to set aside the time to visit even if you don't yet know WHERE your teen wants to visit. It's completely normal to do visits throughout junior year & even in senior year.

Continue Testing & Studying

Don't lose sight of your GPA during all your busyness. Study hard, do well on school & AP exams, and prepare for your ACT or SAT tests. We recommend a formal test prep program.

The GPA your teen will apply to college with is final at the end of 11th grade.

Plan for a Busy Summer

This will be your busiest summer yet! You should start college applications & essays as soon as school gets out to have a smooth start to 12th grade.

Consider other investments of time & strike a balance, so your teen is not overwhelmed. Choices include work, volunteering, summer programs, job shadows, & internships.

Create a College List for Visits & GO!

Now that you have a budget & a shortlist of possible majors that fit future careers that align with your student, visit first virtually or get on campuses for visits - this is the fun part!

Consider other important aspects such as distance from home, geographical preferences, size, & campus vibe.

The process should be organic with the list changing as you experience colleges & learn what your teen likes.



2nd Semester

Continue College Major - Career Planning

Engage in career & major exploration through courses and other curated experiences including volunteering, job shadows, informational interviews, online research from trusted sources, and more.

Start Applications & Essays

Without a doubt, your teen will apply to at least one of the 900+ colleges that use the Common App. The application can be started at any time, but will "roll over" to the current year on August 1st where the student's saved work will appear in the new application.

The personal statement (aka essay) prompts are released each spring. The essay is THE HARDEST part of the application process, so tackle it first without the distraction of school.

Colleges not using Common App may have their own or use the Coalition App.

Check with each college.

Enlist assistance on essays and the process where needed. Ask early!

This will insure a smooth senior year & beating, not meeting, deadlines.

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Summer

College Major ID

Most will require your teen to apply to a specific major or school within the university. By August 1st, be prepared to select a major for each university applying to. This means continuing career planning activities over the summer.

There are some majors at some universities where student transfer into the major is greatly limited or impossible after the student applies. Know this before you apply & make wise choices.

Finish ACT or SAT Testing

Test results can take 2 to 8 weeks to be delivered. Be sure all testing is scheduled to be completed with application deadlines in mind.

Summer to Early Fall

Write College Supplemental Essays

Many colleges require additional essays to be admitted to their university, specific programs, awarded competitive scholarships, honors and scholars programs, and more.

First check inside the application, but also scour the school's admission site to be sure not to miss any requirements.

Most of these essay prompts are not available until after August 1.

Summer to Early Fall



Your high school will hold a meeting to tell your family HOW your student should request transcripts and recommendation letters as well as their deadline for doing so to ensure they arrive by the college application deadline.

HOW this happens varies greatly by high school, so pay close attention & follow your school's guidelines and procedures.

Financial Aid Planning & Application

If you are applying for aid, check the financial aid office at each college for required applications & deadlines.

To use the Federal Student Loan, your student must complete the <u>FAFSA</u>. Some colleges also require the <u>CSS Profile</u>. Follow the hyperlinks to learn more.

Track Deadlines & Hit Submit

Deadlines vary by college, but are 11:59 pm in the STUDENT'S time zone, not the college's time zone. We recommend submitting ahead of deadlines...sometimes technology fails.


